It would be easy to be overwhelmed by the 96 synod recommendations that were accepted by Cardinal John as the way forward.

These 96 recommendation came out of the 13 topics that were discerned by the people of the Archdiocese to be important at this stage of our journey.

Some of you have made an excellent start in creating a pastoral plan around the outcomes of the synod. Several parishes are wondering where to start.

Here are four items of good news:

1. The synod outcomes are a ten year plan -

How do we make people from other cultures welcome?

- ⇒ Introduce yourself your family
- ⇒ Learn some of their basic greetings
- ⇒ Have informal occasions to welcome/introduce them shared lunch, morning tea
- ⇒ Create opportunities for everyone to share some of their culture/foods/music
- ⇒ Be aware of different cultural styles of communication
- ⇒ Encourage them to share some things about their country similarities/ differences to New Zealand
- ⇒ Be mindful that they will need time to adjust to your accent
- ⇒ Recognise they will have talents to share
- ⇒ Remember the personal approach is usually best

Holiday home for families in need

The St Vincent de Paul Holiday Home in Picton is a two bedroom house which can sleep up to six people comfortably. It is centrally located on the High Street and is close to all amenities. The Holiday Home is available for families in need, who, for one reason or another, may not otherwise be able to have a holiday e.g. those recovering from mental or physical illness, people under stress, or those suffering from financial hardship.

To qualify, a family or individual simply needs to be recommended by their local St Vincent de Paul Conference in writing. The cost to rent (which is usually covered by the recommending conference) is a flat fee of \$25 per night or \$150 per week (maximum number of guests is 6).

Archdiocesan Pastoral Council — what is happening?

The chair welcomed **Fr Cirilo Barlis, Lauano Ati Ilaoa** and **Falefou Sio** as new members attending for the first time and farewelled and thanked in absentia **Fr James Lyons** who has served on the Council since 2009.

The Saturday morning discernment for the Council focussed on five strategic directions from Synod 2017, namely

- 3a. Adventurous, creative people with initiative who are able to lead the parish in its response to community needs are identified and encouraged to come forward.
- 3b. Understanding of leadership roles is broadened beyond those traditionally found in parishes and appropriate formation is provided.
- 3e. New models of lay leadership (including team leadership, project leadership and servant leadership) are sought and parishioners are prepared to implement them.
- 3k. Young people are encouraged, trusted and supported in taking the initiative in developing and leading new forms of ministry and outreach.
- 3m. Policies/norms are developed to ensure continuity in practice and lay leadership when there is a change in a Parish Priest.

Other agenda items included two papers on Ch 8 of *Amoris Laetitia*, one a comparison of the *Amoris Laetitia* text and how some Bishops Conferences have interpreted it, the second, draft guidelines intended to apply to the Archdiocese, in regard to practical pastoral caring for and accompanying those in difficult marriage situations; Training for Lay Funeral Celebrants; a Review of Migrant Chaplaincies in the Archdiocese; the 20th Anniversary in 2018 of Ecclesia in Oceania Synod with suggestions as to how this significant anniversary and the 100th anniversary in 2018 of Maximum Illud – Pope Benedict XV's Apostolic Letter, giving new impetus to the missionary task of proclaiming the Gospel, might be celebrated.

The Council has been working on a **self-audit resource** for parish leadership centred on directions and outcomes from the 2017 Synod, as well as the **missionary outreach** of the church. It is hoped to have this resource ready for circulation before May.

Stewardship, a way of life update

A very successful and much appreciated Stewardship Day was held in the Catholic Parish of Wellington South in November 2017, followed by a Retreat Day at the beginning of Advent at St Thomas More in Wilton for all those parishioners who had attended a Stewardship Day during the year. The theme was 'Stay Awake', taken from the Gospel for the first Sunday in Advent, and Bridget Taumoepeau and Bernard Leuthart, two outstanding presenters, ensured a gift of a day for all who attended.

Small group one hour parish reflections based on **Stewardship**, a **Spirituality for Life** have been created by Fr James Lyons and others, suitable for groups
perhaps just wanting to meet for three weeks for a time for formation and

fellowship. These are available from, and can be led by Lorraine (details below).



On the calendar for 2018, apart from Stewardship Days and Stewardship Retreats, are planned Stewardship Breakfasts, and half yearly network/formation meetings for parishes who have experienced a Stewardship Day with Cardinal John.

One of the recurring requests from Synod 2017 was for Gift Discernment workshops in the parish setting; how to discern spiritual gifts and to explore more deeply the concept of giftedness for mission.
